Real Club de Golf Guadalmina



This is the oldest golf course, and it is renowned for its difficulty, making it more suitable for experienced players.

Fairways are narrow and well protected by old trees requiring more straight shots.

Golf Club Los Naranjos



Los Naranjos is a typical Robert Trent Jones Sr. design with generous fairways and strategically placed bunkers and water hazards. The greens, with Penn A4-grass, are spacious and slightly undulated. The tees are long and have four markers: red, yellow, white and black with course lengths starting from 5.131 metres and reaching 6.532 metres at its longest. Since the opening in 1977, Los Naranjos has been the host of several mayor competitions, including the Spanish Open, and is ranked one of the best golf courses in Spain. In 2005 and again in 2008 Los Naranjos was voted Course of the year on the Costa del Sol.

Golf Club Valderrama



The **Valderrama Royal Club** (Spanish: *Real Club Valderrama*) is one of the best known golf clubs in Europe. It is located in the resort of Sotogrande, San Roque in the Andalusia region of southern Spain, and has a single 18-hole course, along with a 9-hole par 3 course.

Valderrama was constructed in 1974 as "Sotogrande New," to the designs of leading American golf course architect Robert Trent Jones. Renamed "Las Aves" in 1981, it was acquired by Jaime Ortiz-Patiño in 1984. The golf course was redesigned and expanded by the original architect and became "Valderrama." By 1999, Valderrama was rated the top course in mainland Europe by *Golf World* magazine. The fourth hole, La Cascada, is the course's signature hole. It is a par 5 with a pond to the right of the two-tiered green. Before the 2016 Open de España, three national teams of four players tried to complete La Cascada in the fastest time. The French team of Raphaël Jacquelin, Alexander Lévy, Grégory Havret and Romain Wattel took four shots to complete the hole in 34.87 seconds, breaking the previous Guinness world record by half.

A technical, exciting and entertaining field, it is appreciated for the way in which the undulating terrain on which it stands has been exploited, for the natural use of a ditch that crosses it in a horseshoe, for the quantity and beauty of oak trees centuries old that rise in over 70 hectares that surround the Golf Club. Designed by George and Jim Fazio and David Mezzacane, the path is located at 300 meters above sea level inserted in the suggestive natural landscape of northern Lazio, and marries the principles of ecosustainability with the green carpet

consisting of a new generation bermudagrass that is well suited to the climate of the Mediterranean basin and able to overcome very harsh winters.

Lunch at the Golf Course.

After lunch before getting back to the hotel we will visit an ancient Etruscan village: Sutri

October 15

After Breakfast we will to have another round of golf at the oldest Italian Golf Course **Olgiata Golf Club**, Located 15 miles north of Rome along the Via Cassia, at the Olgiata, a quiet residential complex, this golf club is a magnificent classic tree-lined parkland golf course. Opened in 1961, it features 27 holes (18 holes West Course and 9 holes East Course) designed by English architect C. Kenneth Cotton and restyled by architect Jim Fazio in 1996. During the years it hosted many important international tournaments including the Eisenhower Trophy in 1964, the World Cup on 1968 and 1984, the European Tour Italian Open on 1973 and 2002 (won by Ian Poulter) and the Challenge Tour Roma Open in 2009, 2010 and 2011. Tee time is scheduled for our group.



Lunch will be served at the Golf Course. After lunch the golfers will join the non golfers for a special visit.

The course is divided in two areas, the east course and the west course, and a total of 27 holes; it was inaugurated in 1961 and designed by English architect C. Kenneth Cotton. The west course is the oldest of the two and has 18 holes. It has been host to particularly important events, some of which international, such as the Italian Opens of 2002, the 1968 and 1984 editions of the Professional World Team

Championship and numerous other Italian Golf Federation competitions. In 2012, it was almost completely redesigned by American architect Jim Fazio, to fulfil new needs and it is now ready to welcome the International Tournaments; it has three set-ups: PAR 71, 72 and 73, and 7 putts for all categories. The recently-created east course is a 9-hole, par 36 course, 2,947 metres in length. Far from being an executive course, the east course is a true course in its own right, where different competitions and tournaments are played out. **The west course record** is 61 shots (-11), fired during the Italian Opens in 2002 by Ian Poulter (ENG) and Angel Cabrera (ARG)



GOLF NAZIONALE - ROMA

Formerly known as Golf Club Le Querce, Golf Nazionale is situated approximately 35 miles to the northwest of Rome and this beautiful course is set in 60 hectares of delightful undulating land. With fairways flanked by stately oaks it's not surprising to note that the club was known as "The Oaks" in English.

Golf Nazionale opened for play in 1990 and Jim Fazio, nephew of the great George Fazio, designed the course with a little help from Italian David Mezzacane. This is certainly a course from the amazing Fazio stable, which was set up to house the Italian Golf Federation. A mere twelve months after the course opened for play Le Querce hosted the 1991 World Cup of Golf, now part of the World Golf Championships. The 1991 event saw the Swedish pairing of Per-Ulrik Johansson and Anders Forsbrände emerge victorious.

The round starts and ends with a lengthy par five and in between, half the holes on the card are doglegged to a certain degree, especially the 6th and 15th holes. There are three consecutive, demanding, par fours on the front nine beginning at the 435-yard 4th hole whilst both par threes on the back nine (at the 14th and 17th) are longer than 235 yards from the back tees. Little surprise then to discover Golf Nazionale has been ranked as high as any other top Italian course for its degree of difficulty.

The 595-yard 1st sets the tone for the whole round and is a real three-shot hole. The drive must avoid a large bunker to the right of the landing area so the preferred line is down the more open left of the fairway. Water to the left and trees to the right threaten the second shot before an approach can be played to a well-guarded, elevated green.

Golf Club Biella "Le Betulle"

Golf Club Le Betulle - Biella

The prestigious magazine Il Mondo del Golf, over the Top Ten Award 29 years, has ranked this course 18 times first, 6 times second and 4 times third, as well as famous international guides consistently placing it among the top worldwide. Built in the late '50s, the course of Biella Golf Club "Le Betulle" (The Birches) is set in the



charming countryside along the slopes of the Serra moraine, just a few kilometres from Biella and Ivrea. It is provided with any facility, including a Club House with restaurant and guest rooms. The course, an 18 holes parkland , par 73 , 6.534 mt., 7.146 yards, has been designed by the English architect, John Morrison, and it extends in a scenario of rare natural beauty, favouring the morphological characteristics of the ground. It is located at an altitude of 1.936 feet asl. Open every day from April 1st till the end of November. Since many years it has been considered one of the best courses worldwide, both from the domestic and the international press. It is an excellent testing ground for players of every ability.


Torino La Mandria golf club's most important feature is its very location, in the heart of a park, one of the most important lowland forests of the Po river plain, once the Royal House of Savoy's game reserve, where you will also find the famous Reggia di Venaria Reale palace. In the park, among the greens, you'll find the most spectacular natural surroundings for golf in Italy. Torino golf club is entirely built around golf. There are neither roads nor buildings. The features that characterise our two golf courses guarantee two different ways of experiencing the game but what they share are the excellent conditions in which they are maintained, done in a manner that respects the local ecosystem. The environmental policy pursued by the club's directors – achieved through an ecologically sustainable management programme involving the sustainable use of the area and the protection of natural resources – has been awarded the Impegnati nel Verde award. Below is a list of the animal and plant species that you'll come across on Torino La Mandria golf club's 36 holes.

Day 1 : Arrival at Paris Charles de Gaulle Airport – transfer to Burgundy

Arrival at **Paris CDG Airport** airport and transfer to your Chateau-Hotel in Burgundy. Pick up by our English-speaking guide and the coach.

Check in at Hôtel Golf Château De Chailly****

Rest of the day at leisure.

Welcome dinner at “Le Roubillon” Bistrot at the Chateau .

Overnight

Day 2 : Day at Golf de Chailly (on site) or cooking lesson and Chateau de Châteauneuf-en-Auxois

Buffet breakfast at the Hotel.

The golfers will spend the day on the **Golf du Château Chailly** (18 holes) Around the castle of the sixteenth century, the Château de Chailly Golf offers you a magnificent 18-hole course. The Rubillon, a little river crosses the hilly area, the harmony of a well-preserved nature will enchant you. This golf was designed by Thierry Sprecher and Gery Watine, professional champion of France in 1989.

Lunch at the golf course

Rest of the day at leisure.

Non Golfers

Cooking lesson in the morning and lunch at the hotel (with own cooked meal, maximum 10 persons)

By 2h00 PM the non-golfers leave to **Châteauneuf-en-Auxois** to visit this nice medieval village which is one of the last proofs for Burgundian military architecture dating back to of the 14th century. Stroll along town walls and towers, the dungeon, the Grand Logis, the chapel.... from the 14th to 17th century, rich Burgundy merchants settled in Châteauneuf-en-Auxois, their mansions are still well-preserved.



Explore the Castle in **Châteauneuf-en-Auxois** : The history of the castle begins in 1175 with a tower built on a promontory dominating the valley where nowadays the Burgundy Canal is situated. During the Hundred Years War, it was fortified by a powerful enclosure and five other towers. The chapel is entirely decorated with 15th century murals depicting Christ and the apostles. See also, the polychrome replica of the tomb of Philippe Pot whose original is kept in the Louvre. From the sixteenth century, the castle is owned by several big families. Apart from some interior fittings, the castle has retained its medieval

character. Return to the hotel.

Dinner at leisure.

Overnight.

Day 3: The Burgundy Wine Route

After Breakfast at the hotel, the entire group leaves for a full day trip on the **Burgundy Wine Route**.

The **Wine Route** crosses the most prestigious part of the famous Burgundy vineyard. 38 picturesque villages of Côtes de Nuits and Côtes de Beaune, between Dijon and Beaune then to Santenay, over a length of 60 km are proud to share their know how in wine making and present their Grands crus.

In the morning drive to **Dijon**, short visit of the city.

Dijon is the capital of Burgundy with a nice cultural heritage: the old town, the Palace of Ducs de Bretagne and its surroundings, the Museum of Fine arts and its Cathedral. In Dijon we also find a number of Michelin Star restaurants, expressing

the gastronomic tradition of this city.

Continuing from Dijon down to Beaune, you will drive through numerous villages that will be well known to wine lovers: **Marsannay-la-Côte, Chevrey Chambertin, Vosne Romanee, Nuits St Georges...**

Depending on the season, a **Pick Nick** or a "Mâchon" will be organized in one of the vineyards

Enjoy one nice **wine tasting** on the road. One of the domains is cultivating truffles and will share their knowledge with you (**truffle hunt** demonstration with dogs, wine tasting accompanied with truffle terrine and bread)

After arrival in **Beaune**, visit the old city and the famous **Hospices de Beaune**.

Before Dijon, **Beaune** was the capital of Burgundy - city of art and wine with magnificent houses, wine cellars, and the famous

« Hospices de Beaune » founded in 1443 by chancellor Rolin. Visit of this Gothic style "hotel dieu" with its varnished colored tiles and his sharp bell towers - certainly one of the masterpieces of the Burgundian medieval heritage. Until 1970s

the Hospices de Beaune was the maternity hospital of the city - today a part is still occupied by a retirement home.

If time permits, visit the **Moutarderie Fallot**, the last independent and family run mustard mill in Burgundy (since 1840). Moutarderie Fallot knew how to preserve the historical heritage and know-how of mustard making.

Return to your hotel, evening at leisure. Overnight.



Day 4: Golf at the Chateau d'Avoise and Bike and Wine Tour

Buffet breakfast at the hotel.

The **golfers** will leave with their own transport to Montchanin / **Golf of Chateau d'Avoise** (18 holes)

The 18-hole course was designed by architect Martin HAWTREE on an area of 120 ha, between groves and birch trees, majestic beeches, century-old oaks and lakes.

The Club House, with its panoramic restaurant, will welcome you all year round. Lunch at the golf course

Return when finished at their convenience.


The **non-golfers** will undertake a bike and wine tour, departure point is Beaune (9h35 AM). Maximum 8 persons

- Transfer by minivan
- Bike ride in the Hautes Côtes de Beaune (electric bikes available with a supplement)
- Tasting a wine in the vineyards
- Visit of the 11th century cellar and tasting of 4 wines from the estate
- Bike in the Grands Cru Montrachet
- Meals in a restaurant or estate in Côte de Beaune in Puligny Montrachet
- Visit and tasting in a domain in Pommard with minimum 4 wines
- 6h00 PM Return by minivan from Beaune to Chateau de Chailly.

Evening at leisure.

Dinner at Local Restaurant

Overnight.





Day 5 : Cluny, Stud Farm and Autun

Buffet Breakfast at the hotel. Full day excursion for all guests.

Drive to the small town of **Cluny** to visit the unique **Abbaye de Cluny**.

The city of Cluny is built around its famous abbey church, the basilica St-Pierre-et-St-Paul. The Abbey was established in 910 and plundered during the revolution - it sadly was serving as stone quarry to build the city. Nowadays, the ruin of the abbey and its "clocher de l'Eau-Bénite" give an idea of the gigantic size of the ancient abbey church - the "centre of Christianity" (187 m length). But also, the old city with medieval houses, its Hôtel-Dieu and the Stud farm "Haras" Admire the beautiful horses in the **Haras de Cluny**:

The Haras de Cluny is situated beside the Abbey since the Napoleonic Empire. Stables dating back to the beginning of the 19th century are integrated into a parkland full of trees. Stud farms had for main mission to assure the reproduction of horses for the war. Today you can attend a demonstration and get explanations on the work of the equestrian artists, at the end of a guided tour.

On your way back to your hotel, stop in **Autun**:

Autun is the only Gallo-Roman city of Burgundy. City tour including the St Lazare Cathedral which is considered as one of the most beautiful buildings of the Romanesque Art Clunisien - and the Rolin Museum. The **Rolin Museum** is the birthplace of Nicolas Rolin (15th century, Founder of the Hospices de Beaune) - it houses rich and varied collections about the Gallo Roman past of the city, works of the middle ages and paintings from the 17th to the 20th century. Lunch included during the full day excursion. Evening at leisure. Overnight.



Day 6 : Golf Pré-Lamy or Château Bussy- Rabutin

Buffet Breakfast at the hotel.

The **golfers** will leave with their own transport to the **Golf de Pré-Lamy**. (9 holes)

Between the meadows of the Auxois and the forest Morvandelle, the Pré Lamy Golf Course stretches under the watchful eye of the Castle and the Collegiate Church of Thil.

Return when finished at their convenience

The **non-golfers** will drive to **Château Bussy Rabutin**.

Chateau Bussy Rabutin is situated in French-style gardens and surrounded by moats. The castle combines several periods. The interior design is still the original one, completely conceived by Count Roger de Bussy-Rabutin (1618-1693), a soldier, courtier and famous writer. You will see a surprising portrait gallery created by a disgraced courtier of King Louis XIV.

On your way back to the hotel, pass by **Flavigny-sur-Ozerain**.

Flavigny is situated on a rock that is isolated by three rivers: the Ozerain, the Recluse and the Verpant river. In 719 the Abbey Saint-Pierre de Flavigny is built and occupied by Benedictian monks. Today, the leftovers of the former monastic buildings became a workshop where the famous « anis de Flavigny » - a world famous white candy is produced. (Visit)

Return to the hotel.

The last afternoon stays at leisure to relax at your Hotel / Spa / Golf...

Farewell dinner at the hotel. Overnight



Day 7 : Departure to Paris

Golf course Chateau de Chailly

OPTIONAL: Visit Cobh Heritage Centre

A unique Irish port town, Cobh is situated on the southern shore of the Great Island in one of the world's finest natural harbours. Between 1848 and 1950, over 6 million adults and children emigrated from Ireland including over 2.5 million from Cobh, making it the single most important port of emigration in the country. The Heritage Centre is located in the old Victorian Railway station in Cobh formally known as Queenstown. The Centre hosts a multi-media exhibition of the Origins, History and Legacy of Cobh. The Queenstown Story relates Cobh's dramatic maritime history including how it was the last port of call for the ill

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-fated Titanic. The steamers and ocean liners continued carrying the Irish to new lives and new lands for many years afterwards. New permanent exhibitions opened in 2011 include the Building of the Titanic, the White Star Line Collection and Female Convict Transportation. Cobh Heritage Centre now offers a genealogy service, where the staff can assist you in tracing your Irish Ancestors.

Spend free time in Cobh.

All pax then visit **Jameson Distillery Midleton**

Whiskey has been distilled in the town of Midleton, County Cork since the early 9th Century. The Jameson Distillery Midleton was founded by the Murphy brothers in 1825. The 45 minute guided tour of the distillery commences with a short audio-visual, after which visitors are taken on a tour of the old distillery by local guides. Follow the old distillery trail through mills, maltings, stillhouse, warehouses and kilns and view the largest pot still in the world - some of these buildings date back to 1795. The tour ends in the Distillery pub, where all are invited to enjoy a glass of Irish Whiskey. During the visit a number of volunteers are selected to take part in a tasting session to compare a Jameson whiskey with a Scottish Whisky and American bourbon. Participants will receive a diploma for their achievement! It is possible for the whole group to participate in the whiskey comparison tasting. The visitor attraction has a Malt House Restaurant and a shop where guests can buy a range of whiskeys and souvenirs. Dinner at a local restaurant in Kinsale – Ireland’s gourmet capital

Day 3: Ring of Kerry



This morning depart Cork and enjoy a day on the **Ring of Kerry**

The Ring of Kerry (166km) is the most famous and panoramic route in Ireland. The astonishing beauty of this large peninsula, Iveragh, comes from the great diversity of its scenery, which offers incessant contrasts. En route around the Ring, take in spectacular scenery - mountains, peat bogs, lakes and magnificent views of the Atlantic Ocean as one travels along the coast road. Leaving Killarney pass through Killorglin, famous for its Puck Fair, then to Glenbeigh where the cliff road affords panoramic views of the Dingle Peninsula and Dingle Bay. Continuing to Cahirciveen, you’ll pass the birthplace of our National hero, Daniel O’Connell. Next, continue on through peat bogs to the town of Waterville. Continue to Sneem Village, famous for its brightly coloured houses. The road then continues through the mountains to Molls Gap and Ladies View with

superb views of the famous Lakes of Killarney. Molls’ Gap is a spectacular photographic viewing point on the famous Ring of Kerry Tour. The visitor is presented with a magnificent view of Black Valley. Close by is the famous Ladies View viewing point with gives a different perspective of this magnificent countryside, with the 3 Lakes of Killarney all surrounded by the Kerry Mountains. Ladies View received its name from Queen Victoria, who was so impressed with the view that she insisted that her ladies-in-waiting should also visit here.

Visit **Muckross House and Gardens**

Muckross House is a magnificent Victorian mansion built in 1843 and is one of Ireland’s leading stately homes. Built on the shores of Muckross Lake, it is beautifully situated amidst the spectacular scenery of Killarney National Park. The elegantly furnished rooms portray the lifestyle of the landed gentry, while downstairs in the basement area one can experience the working conditions of the servants employed in the house. The gardens of Muckross House are famed for their beauty worldwide. In particular they are noted for their collections of azaleas and rhododendrons. However the extensive water garden, the children’s sunken garden and the outstanding rock garden, hewn out of natural limestone, are just some of the features to be discovered.

OPTIONAL: Visit the **Skellig Experience Centre**

The Skellig Experience is a heritage centre dedicated to life on the Skellig islands and was developed by Cork Kerry Tourism in 1992 to make the four treasures of the off shore Skellig Islands more easily understood by all. The Skellig Islands are found 12km off the coast of Kerry. The larger island, Skellig Michael, an UNESCO World Heritage site, was a monastic site occupied from the 6th until the 12th century. The second Island is renowned as a bird sanctuary and houses a colony of 20,000 pairs of breeding gannets, the second largest breeding colony in the world. The exhibition building is a purpose built visitor centre designed to be rugged in feeling and finishes, to reflect the experience which will be undertaken by visitors. The use of concrete vaults with grass topping is designed to echo the wild quality of the south west of Ireland and to blend in with the surrounding hills.

OPTIONAL: Enjoy a **boat tour around the Skelligs**



It is enclosed by three massive dry-stone walls and a "chevaux-de-frise" consisting of tall blocks of limestone set vertically into the ground to deter attackers. The fort is about 900m from the Visitor Centre and is approached over rising ground. There is access for visitors with disabilities to the Visitor Centre but the route to the fort is over rough terrain in parts that is not suitable for wheelchairs. The small visitor centre contains some displays on the history and geology of the area.



This evening enjoy a **medieval banquet and entertainment at Bunratty Castle** or similar. Bunratty Castle is one of the most complete and authentic medieval castles in Ireland. Built in 1425 and plundered on many occasions, it was authentically restored in 1954 to its former medieval splendour and now contains mainly 15th and 16th century

furnishings and tapestries capturing the mood and the style of the times. The castle hosts evening medieval banquets and takes the participants back to the time that the castle entertained its visitors with fine food, wine and song. Set on 26 acres, the impressive park features over 30 buildings in a 'living' village and rural setting. OPTIONAL: Visit Cliffs of Moher



Situated on the Atlantic Ocean and bordering the Burren region, the Cliffs of Moher are one of Ireland's most spectacular sights. Standing 230 metres above the ground at their highest point and 8km long, the Cliffs boast one of the most amazing views in Ireland. On a clear day, the Aran Islands are visible in Galway Bay as well as the valleys and hills of Connemara. The cliffs reach their highest point just north of O' Brien's Tower built by Cornelius O' Brien, a descendant of Brian Boru, to entertain his lady friends. A visit of the tower is also possible. The sweeping view across the Atlantic has recently been ranked the best 'cliff-view' on the planet by Conde Nast Traveler. The respected travel publication has voted the world-famous landmark at the top of a new chart of 'Nine

Gorgeous Cliff Views That Rival The Grand Canyon'. Atlantic Edge is the exciting new interpretive centre at the Cliffs of Moher and is built into the natural landscape. The centre is a huge domed cave that contains images, exhibits, displays & experiences exploring different elements of the mighty Cliffs of Moher: Ocean, Rock, Nature and Man. The visitor centre has a restaurant, shop facilities and ample coach and car parking. A spectacular upgraded 13 km of scenic coastal pathway along the Cliffs of Moher links Doolin to Hags Head.

Spend free time in Dingle and explore the **Burren Region**

The Burren landscape covers over 150 square kilometres and is one of Ireland's 6 National Parks. The region is visually similar to a moonscape, yet shelters a mixture of flora and archaeological sites which have attracted visitors for centuries. Man came here over 6000 years ago, cleared the forests and set in motion soil erosion. Centuries of weathering has produced a terrain of fissured limestone pavements, disappearing lakes, terraced mountains, and underground cave systems. For millennia man has left his mark, megalithic tombs and cooking sites litter the pavements, while medieval towerhouses and churches guard the valleys. Today man is absent from most of the upland, leaving behind ancient field systems, routeways and placenames. Today's visitors to the Burren will find Arctic, Alpine and Mediterranean plants growing together.

Day 3: Ballybunion or Dingle

Today you will depart for Kerry via Shannon Car Ferry across the Shannon Estuary

Ballybunion Golf Club, in County Kerry, is a private members golf club founded in 1893. Home to two unique and challenging links courses – The Old Course and The Cashen Course, visitors from around the world have been visiting the club for many decades. Located by the Atlantic Ocean, Ballybunion Golf Club has two traditional links golf courses. They are both unique in character, testing all aspects of shot making. The Old Course was established in 1893, while the Cashen Course was established in 1984. The Old Course requires shot-making, placement and trajectory control. The Cashen Course requires acute precision especially off the tee as fairways frequently disappear around corners. The careless can easily run out of fairway and find their golf ball buried in marram. It's a wonderful challenge from start to finish.



Non-golfers:

Today you will enjoy a full day touring the **Dingle Peninsula**

Some of the finest coastal scenery to be seen in Ireland can be found in West Kerry, on the Dingle Peninsula, the most northern of the Kerry Peninsulas. This peninsula is famous for its Celtic, pre-Christian monuments and Christian churches. It is also a 'Gaeltacht' (Irish speaking) area, where the Irish language and traditional ways of life are preserved. Dingle town itself is a thriving fishing town and offers plenty of opportunity for shopping or simply savouring the atmosphere of a typical country Irish town with

its plentiful pubs, narrow streets and busy harbour.

OPTIONAL: Enjoy a **Dingle Bay Cruise**

Relish the delights of a short boat cruise of Dingle Bay with an enlightening commentary on local history and look out for Fungie the local celebrity dolphin. The Harbour Cruise is guided tour, takes about 1 hour and is operated with 70 passenger covered boats. As you cruise around the harbour and into the bay learn about the local maritime history, the era of the landlords, the Great Famine and Dingle's historical connections to Spain and France. Nestled amidst the serene splendour of the famous Lakes of Killarney and in the shadow of the majestic Macgillycuddy's Reeks, the club's Championship courses are set in a 25,000 acre National Park. At 7,252 yards from the Championship tees, the Killeen course is amongst the most challenging in the country. The beauty of the natural setting is matched by the treachery of the layout with water in play in virtually every hole. In addition to the 1991 and 1992 Irish Opens, Killeen played host to the Curtis Cup in 1996, and welcomed the European Tour back again in 2010 and 2011 for the Irish Open. At 6,800 yards, Mahony's Point offers golfers a more relaxing round from a scoring perspective, though with strategically placed water hazards and bunkers, combined with vast undulating greens, the course still possesses plenty of potential trouble for even the most skilled golfer.

Situated in South-west Ireland, close to the most westerly point in Europe, the National Park covers over 10,000 hectares of mountain, moorland, woodland, waterways, parks and gardens. A major geological boundary occurs within the Park, and this, in combination with the climatic influence of the Gulf Stream and the wide range of altitudes in the Park, gives rise to an unusual and varied ecology.

Day 5: Kerry to Dublin

This morning depart Kerry for Dublin

First visit **Blarney Castle**

Attracting visitors from all over the world, Blarney Castle is situated in Blarney 8 km from Cork City. An ancient stronghold of the McCarthy's, Lords of Muskerry, it is one of Ireland's oldest and most historic castles, and indeed one of the strongest fortresses in Munster. Built in 1446, Blarney Castle is famous for its *Blarney* stone - The Stone of Eloquence, which is traditionally believed, to have the power to bestow the gift of eloquence on all those who kiss it. Many legends tell the story of the Stone, but why not kiss it and find out the truth behind the legend.



Spend some brief time at leisure at **Blarney Woollen Mills**

The presence of the Woollen Mills during the famine shielded Blarney from the worst effects of the famine, due to its employment of local workers. The success story at the mills continued until a disastrous fire in 1869. By August 1871, the mill was once again operational with a labour force of 222. In 1976 Chris Kelleher, himself a mill worker, bought the old mill property. Within a short period of time Chris and his family transformed the mill into what is perhaps the largest quality craft shop in Ireland.

Arrive in Dublin this afternoon and spend the balance of your day at leisure for personal sightseeing or shopping.

Day 6: Portmarnock Golf Club & Dublin

Enjoy a round of Golf at **Portmarnock Golf Club**

The Portmarnock Hotel and Golf Links is set in splendid surroundings overlooking the beach. The house was originally owned by the Jameson family, famous for their Irish whiskey. Their home has been tastefully converted to an international hotel with the grounds now hosting a magnificent 18 hole Bernhard Langer-designed golf links. Portmarnock is ranked amongst the top golf courses in the world, with a rich history closely aligned to the progression of golf in Ireland. The Club features two courses: Championship Course (18 holes) and Yellow Course (9 holes). The practice facilities at Portmarnock Golf Club are set to a championship standard. The facilities include a driving range and short game area. There is also a putting and chipping green adjacent to the clubhouse.

Non-golfers:

OPTIONAL: Enjoy a **panoramic tour of Dublin**

Enjoy a panoramic tour of Dublin City. Here you will discover the north and south side of the River Liffey. This area offers great striking monuments such as the GPO (General Post Office) on the city main thoroughfare, O'Connell Street, or the Custom House along the quays, as well as the Phoenix Park, the largest public park in Europe. The facilities include a driving range and short game area. There is also a putting and chipping green adjacent to the clubhouse.

OPTIONAL: Spend time in the seaside town of Malahide and visit **Malahide Castle**

Malahide Castle is one of Ireland's oldest and most historic castles. The 100-hectare estate was founded in the 12th century by the Anglo-Norman Talbot family and was occupied by this family until 1976. The castle contains much of its original 16th Century furnishings, a minstrel's gallery and a unique collection of Irish historical portraits. The guided tour of the castle is recommended. Audio Guides are available to take guests through the castle and recount many of the interesting tales associated with it.

Lunch in Malahide at a local café / restaurant

OPTIONAL: Visit **Butlers Chocolate Experience**

Butlers Chocolate Experience is located at the Butlers Chocolate factory in north Dublin, close to the junction of the M1 and M50 motorways. There are three elements to the interactive tour, which lasts 90 minutes in total. There is a 15 minute introductory video, followed by a guided tour of the factory area from a glass viewing area, which takes visitors to nine key viewing / talking points. Each viewing point is supplemented by a video. In the Experience Room, visitors enter a mini-factory area, where they put on factory hats and coats and get to see up close demonstrations of some key elements of chocolate production. There are work stations set up where guests get an opportunity to be a chocolatier and decorate their own novelty to bring home. At all stages of the tour, there is lots of chocolate sampling! If guests do not wish to take the full Experience, it is possible to do the guided tour and hot beverage option, or the guided tour only. The Butlers Chocolate Cafe on-site allows guests the possibility to enjoy a hot beverage and sandwich or pastry.

In the 5th century, St. Buite founded a monastic community near Drogheda in County Louth and today, it is home to an impressive collection of ruins. On the site, visitors can discover an old graveyard, two churches and a sundial. Monasterboice is most famous for its spectacular high crosses, especially the cross of Muineadach an outstanding example of high crosses of the early Christian period, noted as being the tallest in Ireland. The crosses stand in the shadow of a magnificent round tower, about 300 metres high. Monasterboice was a thriving centre of religion and learning until 1142, when the Cistercians arrived at the nearby Mellifont Abbey.

Continue and visit the **Giant’s Causeway**

Encounter Northern Ireland’s favourite giant Finn McCool at the new Giants Causeway Visitor centre on the North Antrim coast which opened in the summer of 2012. According to legend Finn McCool created the Giants Causeway by building stepping stones to Scotland to challenge the Scottish giant Benandonner! The new Visitor centre explores the major themes of mythology, geology, landscape, ecology, culture and social history based on the UNESCO World Heritage site that consists of 40,000 basalt polygonal columns formed 60 million years ago after a volcanic eruption. There are various interactive exhibits and short video presentations within five designated interpretive exhibition areas and the self-guided visit will culminate with a spectacular two minutes audio-visual projection of a volcanic eruption flowing over the walls and onto the floor. Other services and facilities include a large craft and souvenir shop, Tourist Information and restaurant. To enhance the wider visitor experience around the site, a hand held audio guide is available in a range of languages which will bring the wider World Heritage Site to life and inform visitors of unique features to look out for across this amazing landscape. Guided tours of the site are also available. The walks and trails around the World Heritage Site have been upgraded, with the addition of a new accessible cliff top walk for families and people with disabilities. In 2015, Conde Nast Traveler magazine included hopping the stones of the Giant’s Causeway as one of the '50 things to do in Europe before you die'.

As you journey through the nine large galleries of the interactive exhibition, you will uncover the true story of the Titanic, from her conception in Belfast in the early 1900's, through her construction and launch, to her famous maiden voyage and subsequent place in history. Continue to County Down.

Day 6: **Royal County Down or Breadmaking**

Enjoy a round of golf at **Royal County Down Golf Club**

Royal County Down is located in one of the world's most naturally beautiful links settings in the Murlough Nature Reserve. Against the magnificent backdrop of the Mountains of Mourne, the links stretches along the shores of Dundrum Bay, zigzagging back and forth to provide a different vista from virtually every hole. The narrowest ribbons of fairways thread their way through as impressive a set of sand dunes as could be imagined. The fairways are surrounded by purple heather and golden gorse, so beautiful to look at but so punishing for any who may stray from the prescribed path. The 'bearded' bunkers are world famous and feature overhanging lips of marram, red fescue and heather. The greens are fast and many are domed, rejecting any shot lacking conviction. This is a true test of any player's command of the traditional bump and run, the preferred way to play any links. The ninth hole is one of the most photographed holes in world golf.

Upon arrival you will be offered a warm Irish welcome and a cup of coffee or tea and some homemade sweet treats. The session starts with a traditional Irish Fruit Soda Cake. Today, a siege mine and counter-mine can be explored, and the 'bottle dungeon' viewed. St Andrews Castle was the official residence of Scotland's leading bishop (and later archbishop) throughout the Middle Ages. Its scale demonstrated the power and wealth of the bishops, and it was the setting for many important events which determined the course of Scottish history. Some of the key moments leading up to the Scottish Reformation in 1560 were played out within its precinct.

Steeped in history, Glamis Castle has evolved over the years to create a stunning architectural treasure that is full of vitality to this day. You will not fail to be touched by every painting, every piece of furniture, every little detail along the way, as they are sharp reminders that this is not a museum but an incredible family home.

Then visit **Dunkeld Cathedral**

Beautifully situated beside the River Tay, Dunkeld is Scotland's most romantic cathedral. The nave and bell tower, dating from the 1400s, fell into ruin at the Protestant Reformation of 1560, but the 13th-century choir became the parish church, and has remained so to the present day. There are interesting early 16th-century wall paintings in the ground floor of the bell tower, and numerous fine memorials in the choir, including the effigy of Alexander Stewart, Earl of Buchan (c.1343-1405), the notorious 'Wolf of Badenoch'.

Overlooking the scene of one of Scotland's most famous battle sites, Stirling Bridge, is the 220 ft high National Wallace Monument.

It towers over some of the most important battlefields of Scotland's past including Stirling Bridge, the site of William Wallace's victory over the English in 1297, and Bannockburn where Robert the Bruce defeated the same foe in the summer of 1314. Situated on a volcanic outcrop guarding the lowest crossing point of the River Forth, Stirling Castle is a great symbol of Scottish Independence and a source of enduring national pride. The castle's long, turbulent history is associated with great figures from Scotland's past, such as William Wallace, Robert the Bruce and Mary Queen of Scots. It has seen many royal dramas and witnessed the lives and deaths of almost every Scottish monarch

arch up to the Union of the Crowns in 1603.

Welcome to The National Wallace Monument, one of the most distinctive landmarks on the Stirling skyline, commemorating the Scottish patriot and martyr who triumphed over King Edward's army at The Battle of Stirling Bridge. As you climb towards the crown of the famous tower, each level tells the story of Scotland's National Hero, and shows how his part in the history of Scotland has been recognised through the generations. The Hall of Arms shows how the weapons of the time were used by Scottish and English warriors, while the The Hall of Heroes displays the Wallace Sword, which struck fear into the hearts of Wallace's enemies. From the crown of the Monument - the panoramic views stretch out towards Loch Lomond, The Pentland Hills, Fife, and the Firth of Forth all the way to Edinburgh.

It has seen many royal dramas and witnessed the lives and deaths of almost every Scottish monarch up to the Union of the Crowns in 1603.



Then visit **Blair Athol Distillery**

Established in 1798, Blair Athol Distillery is one of the oldest working distilleries in Scotland. Blair Athol Distillery stands at the gateway to the Scottish Highlands in the picturesque town of Pitlochry, and produces a 12 Year Old Single Malt Whisky with mellow deep-toned aromas, a strong fruity flavour and a smooth finish. Dunrobin Castle is the most northerly of Scotland's great houses and the largest in the Northern Highlands with 189 rooms. Dunrobin Castle is also one of Britain's oldest continuously inhabited houses dating back to the early 1300s, home to the Earls and later, the Dukes of Sutherland. The Castle, which resembles a French chateau with its towering conical spires, has seen the architectural influences of Sir Charles Barry, who designed London's Houses of Parliament, and Scotland's own Sir Robert Lorimer. The Castle was used as a naval hospital during the First World War and as a boys' boarding school from 1965 to 1972.



Visit **Dornoch Cathedral**

Dornoch Cathedral's first service was held in 1239 and it continues today as a parish church. Originally Roman Catholic rites were observed but since the Reformation it has been part of the Church of Scotland. The Cathedral has many interesting features, not least the gargoyles on the exterior.

En-route enjoy a **cruise on Loch Ness**

Loch Ness is the deepest freshwater loch in the Scottish Highlands, and is one of the most visited locations in Scotland. Loch Ness is about 24 miles long by one mile wide and at its deepest point, it goes down nearly 1,000 ft. Lying northeast of the Great Glen in the Highlands, Loch Ness is best known for alleged sightings of the crypto-zoological Loch Ness Monster, also known affectionately as "Nessie".

The name Glencoe means 'Valley of Weeping', and has a melancholy air thanks to it being the site of the Massacre of Glencoe in 1692. This was carried out by a regular regiment of the British army, under the command of Captain Rob-

ert Campbell of Glenlyon. The chief of the MacDonalDs of Glencoe had been slow to swear allegiance to William of Orange and the massacre was part of a wider government policy designed to bring pro-Jacobite clans to heel.

On arrival enjoy a **panoramic tour of Glasgow**

Discover Glasgow, Scotland's largest city, with a panoramic city tour. From the magnificent St Mungo Cathedral to the People's Palace and Glasgow Green, explore Glasgow rich past as a religious centre and one of the most important industrial cities in Britain. The Victorian architecture of the centre offer a striking contrast to the extensive parks of the West End. Among those, Kelvingrove offers a haven of peace in the city, with amazing views on Glasgow University's striking buildings and the Kelvingrove Museum. It is not hard to imagine why Glasgow is home to Scotland's most celebrated architect: Charles Rennie Mackintosh.

General info on the Region of Piedmont

Turin, the main city of the Piemonte Region and home to Fiat cars, is an elegant city with historic Baroque cafes and architecture, high-quality shops, and interesting museums, which include the famed Egyptian Museum and the [Shroud of Turin](#) (only occasionally put on display for viewing). Just outside Torino, you can visit the Baroque Savoy Palace and gardens at La Venaria Reale and a little farther west is the stunning monastery, Saint Micheal's Abbey, one of Europe's most important Benedictine monasteries.

Much of Italy's best wines are found in the Piemonte region. The area around Alba incorporates *Barolo*, *Barbaresco*, and *Roero* while the province of Asti is known for *Dolcetto*, *Barbera*, and *Moscato*. This wine area, with beautiful rolling hills topped by picturesque towns, is known as Langhe.

This part of Piemonte is famous for its aromatic white truffles found in fall and Alba holds one of Italy's top [truffle fairs](#). Many restaurants serve truffles during the autumn truffle season and offer special truffle meals. Visiting a few of the wine and truffle towns of the Langhe makes a good excursion any time of year but is especially nice in fall.

The Langhe is also a great area to see castles. Some castles can be toured and a few, such as Grinzane Cavour, offer wine tasting and wine shops.

The Province of **Biella** stretches across northern Piedmont and borders the Valle d'Aosta Valley to the west.

In this unspoiled land, nature has many faces, such as the picturesque Biellese pre-Alpine mountains dotted with pretty valleys, and in the south, the pleasant banks of **Lake Viverone**, a very popular spot with tourists. The reserves enclose wonderful landscapes: the wide moor of the **Riserva Naturale Orientata delle Baragge**, the Alpine environment called the **Zegna Oasis** with its characteristic **Via dei Rododendri**, and the **Parco Naturale della Burcina**, covered in flowers and colors just in time for in spring. Perfectly pairing with the wonders of nature are religious, cultural and artistic treasures galore.

This is a land of marked spirituality, as the many religious sites would attest; the **Marian Sanctuary of Oropa**, one of the most important shrines in Europe, certainly stands out.

In the south, the remains of ancient churches and villages from Middle Ages can still be seen along the Via Francigena, a route for pilgrims that historically connected Rome to the northern world.

This territory encompasses picturesque villages and charming settlements, walled complexes that have remained almost constants in time. Among these is the [Settlement of Candelo](#), unique in Europe.

The charm of Biella Province is tied to its local culture, including the production of articles from high quality wool and crafts, and an amazing culinary tradition and great wines.

Biella is the center of Italian production of fine woolen and cashmere products, which can be bought directly at a discount (and huge savings if compared to U.S. pricing) from the outlet stores of labels such as Ermenegildo Zegna, Fila, Cerruti, Piacenza or directly from the manufacturers that supply them. And for purchases of over \$150, non-EU residents get a tax refund equal to ~11% of the invoice!

FRANCE—BURGUNDY REGION

General info on the Region of Burgundy

Burgundy is one of the most fascinating regions in France, often labelled as the "Land of fine art and living", it is fully of surprises and contrasts. A vast and varied landscape with wide fertile river beds, dense forests, granite hills and limestone valleys.

Day to day life is easy to enjoy and always at a snail's pace. The secret is good food and good wine, with a dash of lush vegetation gently carved by winding country lanes in rolling hillsides. The ancient capital city Dijon is an absolute must to visit when you are in the area.

Canal boat cruises

One of the most important changes for Burgundy was the construction of the **Burgundy Canal** (*Le Canal de Bourgogne*). It dramatically changed the social evolution for hundreds of small villages and hamlets.

The canal is a masterpiece of pre-industrial revolution technology, spanning more than 250 kilometres in length. The canal struggles to span across the region, slowly winding in smooth curves along the plains, or rising steeply with a concentration of canal locks looking like a staircase before reaching the summit at Pouilly en Auxois. For almost two hundred years the waters of this man-made canal have carried the weight of wooden or steel hulled barges. The construction of the canal has changed the destiny of Burgundy, raising its status from a rural farming area to a that of a great state with navigable waterways connecting the north of Europe to the Mediterranean Sea.

Heritage and history

The Celts, Romans, Cistercians and the powerful Burgundian Dukes sculpted the towns and villages through

the centuries. The feudal rule was imposed for many years by the local lords. The dukedom of Burgundy was at one time a large empire spreading through eastern France, into Germany, up to Belgium and the Flanders. Enemies of the French crown and allied with the English king, the succession of Dukes held a solid frontier which eventually became a province with Louis XI, then finally entering the realm of France at the end of the 17th century.

The Catholic church was a driving force of inspiration and energy, the construction of the basilica Vezelay near Avallon, which was founded in 868 AD. The building of the abbeys of Cluny, Citeaux, La Busiere built by the Cistercian and Benedictine orders. There are examples of many of the epochs such as Roman, Gothic and Renaissance such as the castles of Ancey le Franc and Tanlay, or the fortified *chateau* of Chateauneuf en Auxois. The traditional colored tiles used on the roofs can be seen in many places and that of the Hospices de Beaune is a highlight to be seen when visiting Burgundy's old capital. The colored tiles originate from eastern Europe, and has remained a tradition in Burgundy. Even in small villages you'll see examples of glazed roofs breaking the skyline, appealing and relaxing to the eye. » [Read more about the local history](#)

Regional flavors and the cuisine

As the area is a historical crossroads from the north of Europe to Italy and the Mediterranean coasts, the region has inherited influences from many other cultures and regions. The ancient trade routes along the Rhône and Saone river valleys have been travelled upon throughout the centuries, bringing spices and ingredients which are used in the local cuisine. The traditional cuisine is rich and tasty, which can be enjoyed at a very affordable price in many of the small traditional restaurants in villages and towns. Whilst the gastro-nomic restaurants with the highest standards and star ratings can be found in all the corners of Burgundy. Wines were introduced by the Romans as they progressed northwards along the Rhone valley; and then mastered by the monks at Nuits Saint George, creating famous names like Volany, Pommard, Gevery and Aloxe Corton which are now known throughout the world. The vineyards spread southwards for miles on the slopes of the hills, with many producers still using the traditional methods, oak barrels and years of aging in the coolness of vaulted cellars to give us some of the best know Crus. As you travel south through the region, you will pass through the wine growing areas of Chablis, Cote de Beaune, Cote de Nuits, Chalonais and Maçonais before arriving in the Beaujolais. There is a concentration of Pinot Noir and Chardonay grapes in the vineyards, but also lesser well know names such as the Aligoté white which is used in the famous Kir served as a refreshing aperitif.

The varieties of Cheeses are abundant, in all shapes, sizes and colors, strong in character such as the Epoisse or mild and fresh. To be tasted with fresh bread and some of the famous red or white wines. The white Charolais cattle, which can be seen in the green pastures on the hill slopes, bred to give a remarkable quality of beef, which gives us one of Burgundy's most well know dished, the *Boeuf Bourguignon*. Markets and local fresh products are plentiful, cultivated in the fertile river plains of the Saone. The art of Mustards, Cassis, and even Ginger breads are other secret ingredients for a refined cuisine. The art of a gourmet table requires talent and experience which you can find in some of the worlds finest restaurants such as Bernard Loiseau, Joigny, Marc Meneau.


